2023 Northwestern Alumni Medalist: Charles S. Modlin Jr. '83, '87 MD



Charles S. Modlin Jr. '83, '87 MD, former MAA Board member, has been named a 2023 recipient of the Northwestern Alumni Medal-the highest honor given by the Northwestern Alumni Association (NAA).

Since 1932, the Alumni Medal has celebrated alumni who have made a transformative impact in their fields, performed exemplary volunteer service to society, or demonstrated an outstanding record of support for the University. This year's Alumni Medalists join a distinguished group of more than 100 past recipients who truly exemplify the ideals

of the University through their life, work, and service.

A nationally known speaker on reducing health disparities, Dr. Modlin is a urologist and kidney transplant surgeon at MetroHealth, a Cleveland, Ohio-based health system. He also serves as the inaugural director of health equity and medical director of MetroHealth's Office of Equity, Inclusion, and Diversity. In 2003, Dr. Modlin created an annual event that provided free health screenings, examinations, and education to men of color. In addition to serving on the Medical Alumni Association Board, he helped to establish the MD Class of 1987 endowed scholarship. Dr. Modlin earned a BS in chemistry from the Weinberg College of Arts and Sciences and an MD from Feinberg.

ISGMH Symposium in DC: State of Sexual and **Gender Minority Health**



On May 30 in Washington, DC, the Institute for Sexual and Gender Minority Health and Wellbeing (ISGMH) held its annual State of Sexual and Gender Minority Health Symposium. Scientists, policymakers, community organizations, members of the LGBTQ+ community, and members of your Alumni Relations team were in attendance.

Held in collaboration with the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Educational Research Association and supported by the Calamus Foundation, Ernst & Young, and Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine, "This symposium is the first to bring together federal funding agencies, the White House office that advises the President on science and technology, and the researchers shaping our understanding of how LGBTQ+ people navigate education and employment in STEM fields. 



Charles H. White, '30 MD, a selftaught saxophonist and one of the first anesthesiologists in Kansas City, is the subject of the recently-published book, The Book of Charlie: Wisdom from the Remarkable American Life of a 109-Year-Old Man.

About the book:

One of our nation's most prominent writers finds the truth about how to live a long and happy life in the entenarian next door.



When a veteran Washington journalist moved to Kansas, he met a new neighbor who was more than a century

old. Little did he know that he was beginning a long friendship—and a profound lesson in the meaning of life. Charlie White was no ordinary neighbor. Born before radio, Charlie lived long enough to use a smartphone. When a shocking tragedy interrupted his idyllic boyhood, Charlie mastered survival strategies that reflect thousands of years of human wisdom. Thus armored, Charlie's sense of adventure carried him on an epic journey across the continent, and later found him swinging across bandstands of the Jazz Age, racing aboard ambulances through Depression-era gangster wars, improvising techniques for early openheart surgery, and cruising the Amazon as a guest of Peru's president.

David Von Drehle came to understand that Charlie's resilience and willingness to grow made this remarkable neighbor a master in the art of thriving through times of dramatic change. As a gift to his children, he set out to tell Charlie's secrets. The Book of Charlie is a gospel of grit-the inspiring story of one man's journey through a century of upheaval. The history that unfolds through Charlie's story reminds you that the United States has always been a divided nation, a questing nation, an inventive nation—a nation of Charlies in the rollercoaster pursuit of a good and meaningful life.




